# STEM Team Back With A Bang: Coláiste Mhuire Set Sights on Young Scientist Success

The students at Coláiste Mhuire have been busy this term, with the STEM team at the school dreaming up future Stripe Young Scientist projects and preparing submissions for the 'Ideas Made Real' or 'IMR 3D Modelling' Competitions.

Working under their science and technology teachers, the students have been generating and executing ideas that provide practical solutions in the areas of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. Various Stripe Young Scientist projects are being polished as formal entries with an emphasis in areas like sustainability, digital tools, and community enhancement.

The Transition Year pupils have also started learning the basics of 3D design and modelling in preparation for the 'Ideas Made Real' competition at the end of the year. In design programmes, they are now creating three-dimensional models of their initial drawings. It is the first time that they get to engage with 3D technology, and their uptake has been very good.



STEM coordinator at the school, Ms Acton, has witnessed the efforts of the students in amazement. According to her, the projects help them learn teamwork, problem-solving, and getting their hands dirty, skills they can take with them in the future. The involvement in the Stripe Young Scientist and Ideas Made Real is a testament to the ongoing focus at Coláiste Mhuire on innovation and technology. Students at all year levels have collaborated and helped one another with research, design, and applications.

The STEM group is frantically completing their tasks as the deadlines come closer. Teachers explained that they are more than happy to win the competitions, yet the point is for the students to learn by doing and to be in a position to gain experience in science and technology. In addition, Ms Acton mentioned that the projects show how creativity and science can work hand in hand with one another.

Towards the end of the half term the results of applications came back. The school has gotten 18 projects into Stripe Young Scientist this year. The projects ranged from protecting livestock to different forms of energy creation. This is the largest amount of projects that the school has had since the STEM teams creation in 2015.



# Hollow Knight: Silksong Review

## Precision, Beauty, and a Worthy Successor

On February 24, 2017 the now globally popular Hollow Knight was released by the development team 'Team Cherry'. Hollow Knight is a 2D side scrolling action based game and though it starts off simple, eventually the difficulty exponentially increases. So much so, about 56% of players don't even beat the game and up to 70% don't even beat the first boss. Though that may sound as if it's a bad game, it's sold more than 15 million copies and take it from my experience of playing it: the satisfaction of completing and beating the game is worth it.

On September 4th Team Cherry released their highly anticipated sequel to the game 'Hollow Knight Silksong' after more than 7 years in development. The common GTA VI meme that says the new GTA game will never release was a lot like Hollow knight Silksong as during the development period almost no information was being released with many fans speculating that the game will never release due to creative differences and no content. However, this was far from the case as Team Cherry revealed it took so long due to them enjoying making the game to much and they just kept on adding more and more content.

With the gaming world we live in, it's really difficult to find a decent game which is inexpensive. Video game prices are increasing. For example, the new Mario kart and Donkey Kong game both retail at 80 euro. Hollow Knight Silksong stands out as a beam in the dark light of expensive video games with it costing only 20 euro. At this price, it really is a steal and I'd really recommend it to everyone whose looking for a challenge.

Comparative to its older brother, the lore, themes and contrast between both Hollow Knight games is striking. In the first game you play as a small knight where you go on a quest to descend down into a fallen insect kingdom of Hallownest. You explore mysteries and try to stop the spread of an infection that has become rampant- of course that's me explaining it very vaguely. In Hollow Knight Silksong, you play as a side character in the first part, the knights half-sister Hornet and you must ascend into the fallen kingdom of Pharloom and reach the holy capitol called the citadel.

Already you can see the contrast but the gameplay differs as well with Silksong being a lot more acrobatic and faster. In my opinion, the lore and sub content is amazing. To look at one area in particular, we explore a place called the underworks. Bugs travel to the underworks before reaching the citadel where the bugs who seek the journey to the citadel called pilgrims work for very little money. Speaking of money, the currency in the game is rosaries - the strings of beads used for prayers. The citadel is considered a place of holiness and religion but the game explores the corruption that can come with religion. The people who pay with rosaries, receive little pay and with this pay many use it to wash away their sins just like the selling of indulgences during the Reformation. You'll remember that from your 2<sup>nd</sup> year history!

I may not be saying much about this game but that's just because the lore can get so complex and all intertwined with each other and with me saying one small thing, I'd need to say 20 more things which would just leave more questions than answers! The bottom line is that the game is worth it for it's price and how much content there is makes it stand out as one of the best games ever. It's highly believed it will win the game of the year and it is highly impressive how Team Cherry is only a three person team and outperforms many triple A teams. We can see how popular and anticipated the game is given that Xbox, PlayStation, Nintendo Switch and Steam servers all went down due to how many people were online at the same time waiting to buy the game. More than 700,000 players were online at once on the first day on the steam servers alone.

To sum up the game, there are no words to describe how good the game is. With so much content and the satisfaction you get with every accomplishment from beating a boss, getting a new ability or discovering new or secret areas - this game has it all. I myself have been playing for two weeks and have more than 50 hours into the game and am only done about 60 percent of the story and very little of the side content. I will admit, and so will Team Cherry who've said this themselves, it is a sequel game and is meant to be harder than the first so if you are thinking of trying, don't give up at the start. You're only giving up before you strike gold. So if you're looking for a new challenge I shall repeat I highly recommend this game. # The Irish Presidential Election: Connolly Soars to Áras Success

The Irish Presidential election has passed and Catherine Connolly has been elected to replace Michael D. Higgins.

Any citizen who is above the age of 35 could attempt to become president but they can only get on the ballot if they are a current or former president (who has not served more than 2 terms), or "if they are nominated by not less than twenty persons, each of whom is at the time a member of one of the houses of the oireachtas, or by the councils of not less than four administrative counties (including county Boroughs) as defined by law". A person or council can only nominate 1 person for president. If there is only one presidential nominee, it is not necessary to hold an election, they will become president unopposed. A presidential candidate can not be a member of the Houses of Oireachtas. If a member is elected, they must vacate their seat to become president.

There were 5 main candidates this year, those being Catherine Connolly, Heather Humphreys, Jim Gavin, Maria Steen, and Gareth Sheridan. Sheridan only secured 2 out of 4 administrative counties and Steen only got 18 out of 20 members to nominate her, so they didn't make the ballot. Since then they have called for adjustments to the current system, claiming the "nomination process needs to be looked at" (RTÉ).

We had 3 people on the ballot, those being Fianna Fáil's Heather Humphries, Independent Catherine Connolly, and Fine Gael's Jim Gavin. It is important to note that Gavin ended his campaign early, although it was too late to be pulled off the ballot. He ended his campaign following a scandal involving him owing a former tenant of his €3,300 that he hadn't repaid from 2009 (The Journal). Micháel Martin has come under fire with the failed campaign and with Simon Harris facing a Confidence Vote, the Government's position seemed to be weakening by the day.

It was then a two person race. Connolly led the polls coming up to the election with 67% of people believing Gavin made the right decision in pulling out of the race. (Irish Times)

Connolly won the election with 63% of first preference votes. Heather Humphreys had 29% of the vote and Jim Gavin received 7% of the vote. There was a very low turnout, with less than 46% of the 3,614,450. Of the 1,656,436 voters, 213,738 spoiled their votes. That is more than double the amount of voters Gavin received.

Connolly will become President of Ireland on the 11th of November.

#### **Australian Open:**

This year so far there have been 64 ATP tournaments and over 50 WTA tournaments. In an intense Australian Open final, Jannik Sinner bet Alexandr Zverev in three sets with Sinner taking the early lead winning the first set before then besting Zverev in a tie break to take the second set. Finally, he clinched the third set to win the tournament for the second time in his career.

In the WTA section, Maddison keys challenged Aryna Sabalenka in the final. Though Keys took the first set, Sabalenka claimed the second set and after a hard fought tie break, it was Sabalenka who took the third for her first Australian Open title.

#### **Roland Garros:**

During the French open this year, or Rolland Garros as it is known, Carlos Alcaraz won in a tough 5 set battle against his current best rival Jannik Sinner. These two were in nearly every final this year and were each other's best competition.

In the WTA Coco Gauff beat Aryna Sabalenka in the final, 6–7, 6–2, 6–4 to win the women's singles tennis title for 2025. It was her first French Open singles title and second major singles title overall.

#### Wimbledon:

At Wimbledon, Jannik Sinner beat Carlos Alcaraz in the men's singles championship. He won Wimbledon for the first time after he came from a set down to beat two-time defending champion Carlos Alcaraz, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.

In a shocking match Iga Swiatek beat Amanda Anisimova 6-0,6-0. She is the first woman to win a Wimbledon final by that scoreline since Dorothea Lambert Chambers beat Dora Boothby in 1911. Świątek also becomes only the second player in the Open Era to win without dropping a game after Steffi Graf beat Natasha Zvereva at the 1988 French Open. A truly staggering feat.

#### U.S Open:

Carlos Alcaraz again faced rival Jannik Sinner at US Open. Three years after winning his first major title and becoming the youngest No. 1 player in history, Alcaraz reclaimed his place atop the sport with another win at the US Open. And with a new haircut too.

Aryna Sabalenka claimed her second consecutive US Open women's singles final, defeating Amanda Anisimova in the final. Sabalenka's win marked her fourth major title, solidifying her position as world No. 1. Sabalenka overcame self-doubt and emotional struggles to secure the victory, showcasing her mental toughness. Anisimova played much better than her previous grand slam final at Wimbledon and will surely look to improve even more next year.

#### The Road to 2026

#### Stuttering Start for Ireland as Armenia Defeat Follows Hungary Comeback

The Republic of Ireland's 2026 World Cup qualifying campaign began on uncertain footing earlier this season. A stirring late fightback to earn a 2–2 draw against Hungary in Dublin was followed by a disappointing 2–1 defeat away to Armenia, leaving Heimir Hallgrímsson's side with just one point from their opening two fixtures. In this article, I provide you with a concise overview of exactly how these opening matches played out before taking a look at where that has left us in our hopes for a return to the glory days.

#### **Spirited Draw at Home to Hungary**

Ireland opened their campaign at the Aviva Stadium on September 7 in front of a packed home crowd. Any hopes of a controlled start quickly evaporated when Barnabás Varga struck inside the first two minutes, capitalising on a loose defensive clearance. Roland Sallai then doubled Hungary's advantage midway through the first half, punishing further defensive uncertainty.

The second half, however, brought a more assertive Irish performance. Evan Ferguson pulled a goal back shortly after the interval with a clinical finish, igniting belief both on the pitch and in the stands. Deep into stoppage time, substitute Adam Idah rose highest to meet a cross and nod home the equaliser, salvaging a valuable point.

While the comeback showcased Ireland's character, Hallgrimsson acknowledged after the match that lapses in concentration and a sluggish opening period cannot be repeated at this level.

#### **Defeat in Yerevan Dampens Early Momentum**

Four days later, Ireland travelled to Yerevan for a fixture widely viewed as an early must-win. They started brightly, with Ferguson and Finn Azaz both forcing saves, but the breakthrough never came.

Just before the interval, Armenia won a penalty following a defensive error, and Eduard Spertsyan converted to give the hosts a 1–0 lead. Moments after the restart, Grant-Leon Ranos doubled Armenia's advantage with a composed finish.

Although Ferguson responded with a well-taken goal midway through the second half, Ireland's late push for an equaliser fell short. A 2-1 defeat left players and staff visibly deflated at full-time.

So, where does that leave us now?

Well, unfortunately it is difficult to imagine a World Cup table next year that features our national squad of heroes. The list of events required to secure qualification is lengthy and unlikely to happen. However, we continue to hope and cheer on our men. Stranger things have happened!

One thing that Ireland has never lacked is an enthusiastic crowd and every single one of us awaits the rest of the qualifier games to learn of Ireland's fate!

This year's Amgen Irish Open was won in a thrilling fashion by our very own Rory McIlroy. It went to a play-off with McIlroy and Sweden's Joakim Lagergren. It was Rory McIlroy's first ever Amgen Irish Open victory. In an incredible feat, he made a 20ft putt to force the play-off. It was his 5th victory this season.

So far this season, McIlroy has won PGA Tour competitions, the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, The Players Championship, the Genesis Scottish Open and 1 DP World Tour event which was the Amgen Irish Open. Of course, his greatest success this year was arguably his wonderful victory at The Masters, an achievement which completed his career grand slam. It was his first major competition victory since 2014 where he won the PGA Championship. McIlroy has now won 5 majors. In fact, he is the first European golfer to complete the Grand Slam.

Earlier this year, McIlroy also participated in the 45th Ryder Cup along with fellow golfers, Shane Lowry from Offaly, Ludvig Aberg from Sweden and Matt Fitzpatrick, Tommy Fleetwood, and Tyrell Hatton, who are all from England. As the final day came to a close, Team Europe had a successful 15 points to Team USA's 13 points. It went to the last hole where Ireland's Shane Lowry made a putt for birdie to seal victory for his side. This year the Ryder Cup was in the stunning surrounds of New York City but next year, we're bringing it home. Winning an away Ryder Cup is a very difficult challenge to do but Team Europe managed to do it. The 46th Ryder Cup will take place in Adare Manor in County Limerick.

McIlroy, Lowry and the gang will no doubt have their eyes on next year's cup too and with the phenomenal form they've shown this year, who would putt it past them?


